PENTECOST

“The Feast Day of Pentecost is the culmination of the Easter, The Resurrection of our Lord, Celebration. The Risen Christ, having shown Himself to His disciples and having ascended, sends The Promised Gift of The Holy Spirit to the expectant Church. The coming of The Spirit gives the Church the power and the necessary gifts to carry the glad news of the resurrection from Jerusalem to Galilee and to the ends of the earth. The color of The Feast Day of Pentecost is bright red, symbolizing the fire of The Holy Spirit. The Church’s practice is to change to green paraments and vestments on the Monday after Pentecost; thus the Fiftieth Day of Eastertide, the Easter Feast of The Resurrection of our Lord, is concluded.

“The long season which follows is called the Season After Pentecost, and the Sundays are numbered “after Pentecost” rather than the older designation “after Trinity.” Since Pentecost is implied in the Easter event, the Sundays after Pentecost are related to Easter also and form a kind of Post-Easter Season. (Hence, the designation is “Sundays after” rather than “Sundays of” Pentecost.) The Sundays after Pentecost are often said to represent the time of the Church – time between the earthly ministry of Jesus, which is past, and the consummation which lies ahead (Advent is its sign). In the pilgrim state in which the Church lives and exercises its ministry, it is The Spirit of God Who leads and accompanies into all Truth.

“The First Sunday after Pentecost is The Feast Day of The Holy Trinity, which celebrates not so much a doctrine as The Mystery of God. The color for this Sunday is white, but beginning with the following Sunday, or more properly the following day, green is used for the “ordinary time” or “after Pentecost” season, a time of growth in The Spirit, as The Risen Christ is formed in His people.”

(The above was quoted from The Manual on the Liturgy, Lutheran Book of Worship, Pfatteicher and Messerli; Augsburg Publishing House, Minneapolis, Minnesota, 1979, pages 26-27.)

The Feast Day of Pentecost is the third most important festival in the life of the Church, the first being Easter, The Feast Day of The Resurrection of our Lord, and the second being Christmas = Christ’s Mass: The Feast Day of The Nativity of our Lord.

May you truly know of God’s Spirit blowing through your life daily, keeping you on fire!

May the Peace of The LORD be with you always.

PENTECOST

The fiftieth and last day of Eastertide (the Season of Easter) brings a dynamic new resource for seeing and proclaiming The Living Christ in the Church and in the world today: The Power of The Holy Spirit. If the paschal candle has not been extinguished at a worship service on Ascension Day (Thursday, May 13, 2021 this year) it may be extinguished during the reading from Acts 2:1-21 as The Holy Spirit blows through the congregation.

The Season of Pentecost comprises almost half of the church year. Its inaugural festival is The Day of Pentecost, which stands as a point of transition from Easter to so-called “ordinary time.” Christians celebrate Pentecost fifty days after Easter (the word

Pentecost means “fifty” in Greek.) In the Hebrew calendar Pentecost was a festival coming fifty days after Passover. It was one of the three pilgrim festivals in Judaism. It would not be unusual in Second Temple Judaism for Hebrew pilgrims from across the known world – from all the nations – to travel to Jerusalem for Passover and then to sojourn there for the next seven weeks in order to celebrate Pentecost. The biblical roots of this festival lie in the grain harvest (*Leviticus 23:15-21*). It was a type of thanksgiving festival. Evidently by the end of the Second Temple in 70 C.E., its celebratory focus was expanded to include the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai, so that it was a covenant festival. The very fact that its timing is linked to Passover makes this a natural connection (and could also reflect the movement from a strictly agrarian society).

In its New Testament context The Day of Pentecost is not understood to be the founding or the birthday of the Church. At the end of Luke’s Gospel account and at the beginning of Acts (The Acts of the Apostles; recall that the same author wrote both volumes), there is already a community gathered around The Risen Jesus, a community enjoying meal fellowship, experiencing instruction from scripture, and engaging in prayer and praise. Pentecost is a day of fulfillment and inauguration. The Risen Christ had promised the community that it would receive the power of The Holy Spirit in order to inaugurate their mission of bringing to others the Good News of Jesus’ death and resurrection. Thus, in fulfillment of Divine Promises and according to Divine Plans, Pentecost is the inauguration of The Spirit-empowered mission of bringing The Name of The Lord, Jesus The Christ, into the world. Mission – not an organization – is being boldly birthed on Pentecost.


According to Acts 2:41-47, the inaugural events of the Pentecost event resulted in a community engaged in proclamation, baptism, meal fellowship, worship, prayer, praise, fellowship, social ministry, study, stewardship, and outreach. This is the post-Pentecost mission reality of Christian life whether it be in the first century or the twenty-first century. Thus, the Season of Pentecost, “ordinary time,” is geared for us to discover anew what it means to live

in a right covenant relationship with Jesus The Christ as individuals and as community. In that regard there is nothing ordinary about these weeks and months to come for God’s Word is challenging, scolding, cajoling, comforting, and guiding us to live our covenant relationship in ways that reflect the reality of the relationship itself. Just as The Holy Spirit is the key to the events of Pentecost, The Spirit is the key to this “ordinary time” bringing God’s Word of life, forgiveness, mission, and salvation.

STRENGTHENING THE FAMILY**

“As May and June bring special days to honor mothers and fathers, I am thinking about the role of parents in raising children to be faithful. Parents continue to have the most influence on the attitudes, behaviors, and outlook of children and young people. Knowing that truth, a congregation’s emphasis should be on strengthening families’ abilities to be faithful to The Gospel of Jesus The Christ, rather than offering ‘programs’ to do that for them. Many congregations still operate from a ‘program’ perspective.

“I am reminded once again that the primary purpose of a congregation is to gather regularly for worship and service to Jesus. It is deeply moving to watch children as they participate in worship by singing and serving as worship ministers. But we need to remember that the power comes from drawing these children into the life our Lord offers for us and to us in His life, death, and resurrection. We have not come to watch our children perform, or to worship them, but to invite them to participate in the promises that Jesus offers.

“How can I be a better parent at modeling faith for my children? The bottom line is that if you want to be a better parent when it comes to passing faith on to your children, the most powerful thing you can do is to bring your children regularly to worship and make that as normal a part of their life as eating, sleeping, and breathing. It is amazing how simple that solution is. Even more amazing is how hard we try to come up with another way, any way, except the most simple and obvious way to be effective witnesses to our faith in Jesus The Christ.”

Bring your children to church.

Bring your grandchildren to church.

Bring your nieces and nephews to church.

Council Minutes

St. John's Lutheran Church
April 20, 2021

Pastor Beake conducted opening prayers and devotions.

Guest: Bob Schreiber

Honi Allen discussed the pre-school program which will occur in mid-May. There are two classes of seventeen. A limit of four persons per child will be followed. The gym would accommodate fifty people spread out. The ceremony will be both in person and Zoom.

Bob Schreiber thanked the church for it's contribution to the Youth Center and described the activities available there.

MSC (Blaker) to approve the March 16 minutes.

PASTOR'S REPORT: Pastor reported the death of Ray Henery who will be buried in Blackfoot at a later time.

Pastor reported that in-person attendance is increasing. Attendance at the internet worship averages 25-29. The internet ministry will continue. People from surrounding communities have been attending the Sunday worship.

APRIL BILLS: MSC (Ferguson) to pay the bills..

MARCH FINANCIAL REPORT: Tiede observed that the church financial condition is strong. People are generous and committed. MSC (Porath) to approve the financial statement.

CHURCH CALENDAR: The blood drive scheduled for April has been canceled. A drive will be held in July, but no date has been set.

The quilt dedication will be on May 9. The quilts will be displayed in the sanctuary and are available for sale. Those not purchased will be donated to various causes.

Patty Porth would like to schedule a church cleaning day. Ferguson observed that the flower beds and alley need attention. We will put the debris in piles, and the city will pick it up the week of May 3-8.

OLD BUSINESS: On Friday the city will deliver a bin to collect items for shredding (years old bills, statements, bulletins, and the like) The church will receive some tall filing cabinets from Kacy Gehring for future use. The history of the church has been organized and is in the safe.

NEW BUSINESS: A pinewood derby has been scheduled for May 8. Pre-school graduation will be on May 12 and 13.

Financial: A PPP loan of \$26,700.00 has been received. Forty per cent must be used for salaries. The financial committee recommends that the remainder be allowed to roof repair. Three priorities are the kitchen roof (which is collapsing), the

fireside room, and the youth lounge. We also may need a new dishwasher. And we could consider converting to LED light fixtures through Idaho Power. Ferguson will get some bids. \$31,300.00 is available and should be used now. The roof situation is not going to get better on its own.

Discussion of stages of reopening the church: A discussion of resuming singing, the wearing of masks, and other things was held. Pastor will check with the musicians. Many people would like to sing, but the musicians may not want to play.

Most of the board wants to move to stage 4 of the reopening plan, making masks optional. We will explore the singing part, if the musicians are reluctant, we might try acapella.

Kelly Brannock would like to begin AF Daily Bread in September.

The next meeting is May 18, 2021
